

Total Child Population by County



Vermilion: 20%+ children of color




% of Children at or Below Poverty




Vermilion County Reports Made vs. Indicated by Source FY 2017



Vermilion County Foster Care Entries by Age FY 2017




■ 14 years +



Among the three permanencies, guardianship is the least likely outcome. In FY 17, White children made up the largest proportions of adoptions and reunifications, followed by African American children. Hispanic and youth identified in the "unknown" race category represented a minimal number of adoption and reunification cases.


Vermilion County % of Youth in Care Compared to Population






White children make up the largest number of children in care (68%), which is proportionate to the number of children in the general population.

African American children in Vermilion County are 1.5x more likely to be in care than in the general population. Hispanic children make up a minimal proportion of the children in care, which is proportionate to the number of children in the general population.

Summary

- ❖In Vermilion, the percent of foster care entries among African American children (20%) is comparable to the number of African American children in the population (18%). However, African American children are still overrepresented among the total youth in care.
- ❖ White children make up the largest proportion of youth in care in Vermilion (68%).
- In FY 17, White children represented the largest proportion of adoption and reunification cases.

Summary

Children age 0-5 made up 53% of foster care entries in Vermillion.

Vermilion (and Macon) Counties have the highest child poverty rates.

Among the seven counties, Vermilion has the highest unemployment rate among African Americans (23%).

Service and Resource Implications

- Need for **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT** to address high unemployment, particularly double digit unemployment among African Americans and Latinos.
- ❖ Need for LIVING WAGES to address the working poor.
- ❖ Need for CULTURALLY RESPONSIVE child welfare services and ACCESSIBLE community based RESOURCES including:

Human Services Mental and Behavioral Health

Education/Child Development Medical Care

Labor/Economic Opportunities Faith Based Partnerships
