Among the three permanencies, guardianship is the least likely outcome. African American children were more likely to be adopted, followed by White children. Reunifications are more likely to occur among White children, followed by African American children. Hispanic children made up a small proportion of adoption and reunification cases.

## Summary

*Unemployment is a concern for all groups within Macon County with the unemployment for whites $2 x$ the national average.
*Among the seven counties, Macon County has the second highest unemployment rate for African Americans (22\%), and the highest unemployment rate for Latinos (19\%).

Macon (and Vermilion County) has the highest child poverty rate (30\%).
*Children aged 0-5 made up the majority (58\%) of foster care entries.

## Summary

* In FY 17, African American and White children comprised a comparable number of adoption and reunification cases.
* African American children are $2 x$ as likely to enter and remain in foster care.
*African American children represent over 50\% of adoption and over $40 \%$ of reunification cases in Macon County.


## Service and Resource Implications

* Need for ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT to address high unemployment, particularly double digit unemployment among African Americans and Latinos.
* Need to mobilize resources for families with children in the b-3 age range
* Need for LIVING WAGES to address the working poor.
* Need for CULTURALLY RESPONSIVE, ACCESSIBLE RESOURCES to address the disparities in foster care:

Human Services
Education/Child Development
Law Enforcement
Labor/Economic Opportunities

Immigration/naturalization
Mental and Behavioral Health
Medical Care
Faith Based Partnerships
